



## FREEDOM OF INFORMATION REQUEST

### FREEDOM OF INFORMATION REQUEST 2024/ 26959

Dear Requester,

Thank you for your recent request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

**Section 1** of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA) places two duties on public authorities. Unless exemptions apply, the first duty at, **Section 1(1) (a)**, is to confirm or deny whether the information specified in a request is held. The second duty at, **Section 1 (1) (b)**, is to disclose information that has been confirmed as being held.

The information that you are seeking is in relation to the following:

#### REQUEST

- 1) Details of all speeding offences, including:
  - a) The date each offence took place
  - b) The speed at which the vehicle was travelling
  - c) The speed limit in force at the location the vehicle was caught

between 1 January 2022 and 1 January 2024 inclusive. I would like the information in an Excel spreadsheet. For instance, results may look like the following:

| Date of offence | Speed of vehicle | Road speed |
|-----------------|------------------|------------|
| 01/01/2022      | 43               | 30         |
| 16/12/2024      | 22               | 20         |

#### RESPONSE

There is a total of 692 speeding offences recording during 01/01/22 and 01/01/2024.

Unfortunately, we cannot answer this request as it will exceed the 18-hour time limit to complete a request. In order to retrieve the data, each record would need to be reviewed. It would take approximately three minutes to review each individual record, which would equate to 35 hours of research. Therefore, a Section 12 Excess Cost exemption has been applied.



## **Section 12 – Excess Cost**

The exemption applicable to the information you have requested for this question can be found at Section 12(1) of the Act and this refusal notice is issued under Section 17.

Section 12(1) “does not oblige a public authority to comply with a request for information if the authority estimates that the cost of complying with the request would exceed the appropriate limit.”

In the case of a police force, the appropriate limit is set at £450, which is calculated at £25 per hour (i.e., 18 hours). Gwent Police would have to conduct a manual search to find and extract the information for this question. This would take more than 18 hours of staff time therefore we are unable to answer this question and the exemption is engaged.

We appreciate that you may be disappointed on this occasion that we are unable to provide the requested information. However, under Section 16 of the Freedom of Information Act 2000, we have a duty to assist you in relation to refining your request, where we may be able to answer some of your questions.

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Freedom of Information Act is a public disclosure regime, not a private regime. Any information disclosed under the Act is thereafter deemed to be in the public domain, and therefore freely available to the public and will be published on the Gwent Police website.

If, upon receiving a response to a freedom of information request, you are unhappy with the outcome, you may request an internal review. **This should be made within 40 working days of the initial response.**
